This year's fair, with its distinctive mix of contemporary design, collectible design classics, art, and exquisite jewelry, drew over 6,000 enthusiasts on its opening day. A testament to its allure, the fair showcases the eclectic curation by international design galleries, featuring both established names and emerging talents. With 62 galleries from 16 countries across Europe, Asia, and North America, including 12 newcomers, PAD London continues to captivate with its diverse offerings.





Highlights of the 2023 edition include Gallery Fumi's 15th-anniversary celebration, featuring captivating pieces like Stine Bidstup's Light Entanglements chandelier. Galerie Philia made its PAD debut, presenting a visually contrasting booth that's sure to ignite the imagination. Supported by Ruinart, the PAD London Prizes recognize the most distinguished spaces and pieces, bridging contemporary and historical design. These accolades are curated by a prestigious jury led by Design Museum director Tim Marlow, along with honorary presidents Jasper Conran OBE, Yana Peel, and Francis Sultana, in collaboration with leading figures from the worlds of design, art, and fashion.

Creativity knows no bounds, and that's what PAD London is celebrating




